'Situated between the two rival Cold War blocs, Yugoslavia produced a "parallel universe" of modern architecture, built to meet the needs of the country's unique brand of self-managing socialism, often describes as the "Third Way." Responding to the social and political climate, Yugoslav architects freely reinterpreted international currents in design, merging them with a variety of local building traditions.'

The rationale of the national project of Yugoslavian Modernism that tried to homogenize and rationalize the diverse traditions, opened up today inviting different cultural currents that make cities in the Balkans a collage of diverse global cultural and religious directions resulting in the melting-pot of the Balkans that has entered in a direct dialogue with the Metropolitan urban culture and traditions of European cities.

Sarajevo's and Split's strong interaction with Western and Eastern Europe, and the increasing Balkanization of Europe is a reality. Cities in the Balkans are the place of unusual urban qualities remains of changing social revolutions and of voids and abandonment, constantly re-encountering its own history of crisis, resistance and resilience. It is this reconstruction that has created an alternative paradigm, based on principals of re-building.
